


Message from Mayor of Looe Cllr Tony Smith

Lifeboats

We are proud to announce that David Haines, our former Lifeboat Operations Manager at Looe RNLI who has dedicated over 30 years to the RNLI, has been recognised in His Majesty The King's New Year Honours for his role in helping the charity save lives at sea.

David is awarded a British Empire Medal (BEM) for his services to the RNLI.

His citation reads: 'A humble hero whose legacy transcends accolades, his selfless devotion is an inspiration to everyone in guaranteeing a path of service, courage, and kindness for generations to come.'

From the moment Looe Lifeboat Station reopened its doors in 1992, David has provided selfless service and steadfast commitment to saving lives at sea. Over the past three decades, he has held volunteer roles across all levels within the station, initially as lifeboat crew and then helm, before stepping into the pivotal role of Lifeboat Operations Manager at a time when the station needed strong leadership and stability. His visionary approach has ensured the seamless operation of the station, safeguarding its future through strategic planning, volunteer empowerment, and community engagement. During David's 32 years of service the lifeboats in Looe have been launched on

service 1,027 times, crews have assisted 826 people and saved 65 lives.

At a time of tragedy when a 19-year-old lost his life unexpectedly in 2009, he emerged as a beacon of hope and resilience in Looe, driving an appeal to fund and name a lifeboat after the young man. Over the past two decades, Looe has been well served by two D class lifeboats named in memory of Ollie Naismith.

David also gave his time generously to advocating the RNLI's lifeguard service in south east Cornwall in the busy summer months, ensuring the lifeboat crew and lifeguards train together regularly to achieve the maximum lifesaving effect. This also extended to supporting the lifeguards in their annual rescue board challenge, a gruelling open water paddle using nothing but their arms to raise essential funds for the charity.

His passion for lifesaving stems from a lifelong connection to the sea. In 1979 David's brother John, aged 19, tragically died following a fishing accident at sea. Ever since David has worked tirelessly on and around the water playing his part in water safety. David has been a boat owner since the age of 15 and has worked as a commercial fisherman, as well as serving as a Looe Harbour Commissioner. He also works on the fish market and can usually be found on East Looe guay helping the fishing community, or on his ferryboat Emma Louise.

His contagious enthusiasm has inspired countless individuals to join the RNLI, including his own family members who have followed in his footsteps.

He was recognised with a special Rotary Award for his vocational and voluntary work in 2018, and the RNLI's 30-year Long Service Award in 2022.

He retired from operational service on his 70th birthday in October and has left an outstanding lifesaving legacy as the crew embark on a new chapter. Fortunately, the community has continued to benefit from his unparalleled expertise and wise counsel as he has taken up a new role as Chair of the Lifeboat Management Group, representing the wider activities of the RNLI.

David, in receipt of his BEM said: 'I was so surprised when I received the letter saying that I was going to receive an honour, it took a while for the news to sink in. I feel incredibly proud, and humbled, to have been recognised in this way but I couldn't have achieved anything without the support of the Looe RNLI family - from the operational crew to the many fundraising, shop and

boathouse guide volunteers, and the local community who have supported Looe RNLI so well over the decades.

'On a personal note, I'm also very proud that my family have been influenced by my volunteering and have all been involved in the RNLI and maritime in one way or another. I'd like to thank everyone who has made my time with the RNLI so memorable, and for my family who have been so supportive.

'My 32 years as a volunteer has been immensely rewarding and I feel privileged to be part of such a fantastic organisation.'

In total five volunteers from the RNLI have been recognised in the King's New Year's Honours. RNLI Chief Executive Peter Sparkes said: 'What a wonderful way to end the RNLI's 200th anniversary year with recognition for these volunteers from right across the UK.

'For a charity to have survived 200 years based on the time and commitment of volunteers – and on the sheer generosity of the public who provide kind donations – is truly remarkable. Good people responded then and have continued to do so for two centuries: men and women showing extraordinary courage, supported by volunteers and donors who hold the RNLI's values dear. 'Our volunteers are the heart of our lifesaving service – we couldn't do what we do without them. My congratulations to these five worthy recipients and my sincere thanks to the thousands of others who continue to volunteer their time as we embark on our third century of saving lives at sea'.

Albatross Boathouse






Shouts

Keeping safe on the coast: RNLI lifeguard cover on the Whitsand bay beaches have now finished for this year, so it is more important than ever to Respect the Water, check the tide times, wear appropriate buoyancy aids and take a method of calling for help. If you are on East Looe beach check the orange windsock on East Looe Town Trust's building by the Old Lifeboat Station. If it is pointing out to sea this denotes an offshore wind which can easily blow an inflatable, stand up paddleboard, kayak or canoe out to sea and hinder your attempts to return to shore safely.

Float to live:

However you end up in the water, if you get into trouble, remember to Float to Live. Cold water shock is our body's natural response to entering cold water and can very quickly lead to drowning. Floating, even for a short time, allows the effects of cold water shock to pass. It enables you to regain control of your breathing and your survival chances will greatly increase.

You can learn how to float following these five simple steps:

- 1. Tilt your head back, submerging your ears.
- 2. Relax and try to control your breathing.
- 3. Move your hands to help you stay afloat.
- 4. Your legs may sink but that's OK everyone floats differently.
- 5. Spread your arms and legs to improve your stability.

We actively encourage practising how to float in a safe environment. It's a lifesaving skill and having the confidence to float in a life or death situation could make all the difference.

If you see someone struggling in the water, fight your instinct to jump in and help. Stay on land and 999 and ask for the Coastguard at the coast, or Fire & Rescue when inland.

Tell the person in danger to float on their back and throw them something that floats, which they can use for buoyancy.

LOOE OLD CORNWALL SOCIETY



EAST LOOE TOWN TRUST

New Year is traditionally a time to both look back at history and forward to the future. East Looe Town Trust has existed since 1890 when the Trust Deed was established and the former East Looe Town Council ceased to exist. It was registered as a Charity in 1964 and was then regulated by a scheme of the Charity Commissioners in 1980. It became a Charitable Incorporated

Organisation in 2016. Our office often receives enquiries (for example, about toilets) that should be directed to Looe Town Council and they are often surprised that we are completely separate organisations.

Looe is a unique place in many ways but one of its quirks is that charities own, maintain and manage land and buildings more than the Town Council. This can be confusing for residents and visitors alike! Looe Town Council is the local authority body – they are based above the Library in the Millpool Car Park. Then there are the Harbour Commissioners, the Looe Development Trust, West Looe Town Trust and East Looe Town Trust. We pride ourselves on working co-operatively for the good of the town but we are all completely separate organisations.

East Looe Town Trust owns and maintains the beach and seafront, the Wooldown and commercial premises as well as both Guildhalls – the "new" one completed in 1877 is the iconic building with the clocktower on Fore Street and the fifteenth century Old Guildhall now houses our Museum on Higher Market Street. Many of our buildings are old and listed and so the cost of maintaining them is considerable.



After a lot of hard work by the board of Trustees and the Trust Manager, ELTT was successful in obtaining a grant which has partially funded the renovation of the Old Lifeboat Station and The Watchtower on the seafront. As well as renovating the buildings, the project also includes provision to create an on-line history of the building and the boats and crew that were involved in some heroic rescues – please keep an eye out for the launch of this informative and entertaining new website. We have also worked with Devon and Cornwall Rail Partnership to create a heritage walk – details will be announced soon. This iconic Old Lifeboat Station and the



adjoining Watchtower were erected in 1866 after it was realised that Looe needed its own lifeboat.

The grant from the Good Growth Fund has helped up to renovate the buildings, which were in an almost derelict state.

The work has involved replacing broken lintels (including the main one over the arched entrance) and strengthening the structure as well as rewiring the entire building, so that it will last for another 200 years, although now used in a slightly different way.

The Watchtower will be repurposed to be used as the Trust office – this is physically a much smaller space than the current office, but it will reduce our carbon footprint considerably. With modern methods of digital storage of information, this has reduced the amount of office space needed for a modern organisation. The Watchtower and the nearby workshop/tractor shed will have their electricity supplied by the newly installed PV system – via solar roof slates (not large solar panels). This is very new technology and we believe that we are among the first to use it in this area.

The Old Lifeboat Station was advertised for rent by Miller Commercial and the Board of Trustees are delighted to announce that after a stringent assessment of all applicants the successful tenant, subject to successfully obtaining all permissions, is Penrock Distillery. It has been a very long process to get to be able to make the announcement as all due processes had to be followed and then checked by the Charity Commission.

Once the Old Lifeboat Station work has been completed, the keys will be handed to the new tenant, who will then fit it out to their design. ELTT is very pleased that the successful tenant is Looe boy Sim Daley who started Penrock Distillery when he returned to his home town, after learning the craft in Nashville, USA. 


LOOE ISLAND MARINE NATURE RESERVE UPDATE



Kingfisher!

Yes, I know, people are always surprised when we say that we get kingfishers here on the island. We do indeed feel very lucky to see these jewel-like birds, especially in the depths of winter. In fact, they are often recorded in the winter by the coast, where it is milder. There have been plenty of recent sightings – either perched around the east side of the island or zipping fast and low over the water towards the mainland. Local birder and island volunteer Derek Spooner has photographed kingfishers here on the



island as well as along the shore at Hannafore – perhaps it's the same bird?



As usual in December we see cormorants building nests on the southern cliffs – they really put on a great display in their breeding plumage. Then there are also the ravens who regularly nest here – they have been cronking, displaying and defending their territory over the island so we expect to spot them at their nest soon. It's always great to see these signs of breeding in the depth of winter and makes us look forward to the Spring.

One of the best spectacles though are the roosting gulls. Last year we contributed to the BTO's winter gull survey (WinGS) and counted around 5,000 gulls coming here to safely spend the night around the island's shores. Perhaps at dusk, you've noticed gulls streaming down Looe Harbour and heading this way? They are mainly a mix of great black-backed and herring gulls. Experts have listed both these birds as being of 'conservation concern', with herring gulls, a bird we tend to think of as 'common' being on the red list (of greatest concern) as numbers have been declining for decades.



So it's both a joy and reassuring to witness large numbers of gulls in the area.



All year round we monitor seals. Some of the monitoring is ad hoc. For example, the resting grey seal (an adult male called One Spot 2) in the photograph was recorded by us as we were working outside back in December. All our records are shared with Cornwall Seal Group Research Trust. They collate all the sightings and are able to create calendars of each identified seal. So we know that One Spot 2 was first identified around the island back in 2014. Since then, he has been identified 197 times! 11 of these occasions

were during our monthly surveys and he's also been identified by 21 different volunteers at five different sites east and west of Looe. So, despite his wound he's still with us – what a survivor!

And what about plants and insects? There are plenty of yellow catkins dangling from the hazel trees. Hazels are wind-pollinated and catkins are actually the male flowers. The female flowers are much less obvious, being small buds with tiny little pinky red 'tendrils'. As they are wind-pollinated they don't produce nectar to attract pollinating insects, but with little else in flower in the winter insects still visit the catkins and collect protein rich pollen. Indeed, we have seen a few early emerging bumblebees, although they've mainly



been feeding on the purple flowers of the garden hebe shrubs.



Finally we have recently had some lovely clear skies so we thought we'd share a moon photo with you all:) Here's to a bright and wildlife filled 2025!

Our secretary, Mandy Ricketts volunteered to assist our Treasurer, Neil Playne, because at the time Neil was unwell. Mandy also volunteered to assist our Poppy Appeal organiser, Annette Bryan, who had taken over the post from her late husband David Bryan. We wish all our committee all the best in their positions, be them retained or new.

Neil Playne: It is with great sadness that we heard that our branch treasurer Neil Playne had passed away on 19th December after a short illness. Neil had served in the RAF in Cyprus during the terrorist emergency and joined the British Legion in 1990. He served for many years as our branch Treasurer and will be greatly missed, both as an active branch member and as an individual. From the number of comments on our FB page, our thoughts of Neil are echoed throughout the town of Looe. Our branch's condolences have been passed to Neil's family and we are giving then any assistance that we can. Neil's funeral was held on 20th January, it was extremely well attended and our branch standards were on present.



War Memorial Talk: On Saturday 11th January Louis Portman, gave a talk to the Old Cornwall Society on the servicemen remembered on our Looe War Memorial. The talk was very well received with 80+ people attending.

Looe's War Graves: Our November branch meeting was the last that Neil Playne was able to attend, but he expressed his concern about the state of the war graves in the West Looe Cemetery. EVERY November, prior to Armistice, Neil would place a small wooden poppy cross on each of the war graves in the cemetery. Our branch contacted Cormac, Cornwall Council's contractor, who stated that all graves, war graves or not, are treated the same.

This reply frankly does not fill us with confidence about the care of the Looe war graves. We are therefore planning to do a survey of the war graves in both the West Looe Cemetery and St Martin's church yard, with the object of tidying up the graves and headstones. We would have liked to have carried out this work sooner but we are slaves to the weather. It must be noted that many of our local war graves have family headstones and not the standard Commonwealth War Graves headstones.

Branch Meetings: We always hold our meetings on the first Monday of the month, come rain, snow or New Year's Day. They start at 7:30pm sharp in the ground floor bar of the Looe Social Club, West Looe Quay. You do not have to be a member of the Social Club or an ex-service person to attend one of our meetings, so why not come along, say hello, and see what we do.
